CABALLERO CREEK PARK Confluence Project

The Vision

Caballero Creek Park will be located at the confluence of the Los Angeles River and Caballero Creek, the River's only tributary stemming from the ecologically-rich Santa Monica Mountains. The project, which is a partnership between MRCA and the City of Los Angeles, will restore 1.5 acres of an asphalt lot into a multi-benefit natural park. The design utilizes an innovative mix of low-tech mechanical and biological methods for watershed protection, including a bioswale and a small water treatment wetland. The park will connect to the future L.A. River Bike Path which will create connectivity to other parks and open spaces including Reseda Park, Sepulveda Basin Recreation Area, and other green spaces along the Los Angeles River.




Caballero Creek Park's water management technology will serve as educational tools that also recreate riparian habitat to infiltrate and naturally filter runoff from eleven acres of the surrounding streets. The wetland will create habitat, clean the water and store it on-site for consistent irrigation water supply powered by on-site solar panels. These demonstrations of water capture and treatment will connect the public to California's diminishing riverine ecology, in addition to cleaning and protecting local water quality along with its aquatic inhabitants.




